Pastoral Notes

Always...

Njalo! Siyathandaza, siyanikela, siyadumisa, thina! Always we pray, always we give, always we bless, always! - "Njalo" Shona hymn

This hymn I learned in seminary, from an area within Zimbabwe, has been with me lately, with a recent memory as harmony. At the end of the summer, as some of our congregation gathered on the patio, a few of the children gathered, including my own, began to run around the new pathway of the memorial garden. There were some shrieks of joy, the stuttering rhythm of tiny sneakers on stone. Their laughter and play in this new sacred space where we hope to remember saints of this congregation felt right, and tender, and holy... a reminder that in the life of Christ all things are made new.

(And, in keeping with this gentle movement of life, and loss, and new life... I hope you will mark your calendars for both Baptisms and New Members Sunday on October 27th, and our All Saints Day dedication of the Memorial Garden November 3rd.)

Though our children may not know all the people behind the names which will be remembered on the stones in the garden, many of those saints helped create the community in which they now rejoice. They *will* know something of Jesus, and of our beloved saints here on the Foreside, simply by how they feel growing up here. Here, where they first feel belonging, and then belief... first loved, then a life-giving calling. There is no shortcut to create beloved community like this... it always comes from years, and decades, and even centuries of caring commitment.

If Jesus, the life and love he shared, if the body of Christ gathered into Foreside Community Church has been a source of meaning for you... It is probably because some sweet spirit, beloved family or soul friend, *told* you about—or *showed* you—these things. Someone helped make space for you here... by a ministry, practice, or gift... or by simply inviting and welcoming you. They doubtless received that same kind of gift from one before them... and on and on it goes until we find that the off-hand invitation to worship, a sincere smile at coffee hour, the listening ear to a friend's searching faith... well, those everyday gestures are actually descended in one unbroken line from Jesus's call, gathering new friends and saying, "follow me."

So, I might ask you to reflect on a person or people who called you into this life and community of Christ here on the Foreside, or on the journey of faith in general. Take a quiet moment and call their faces—their welcoming presence—to mind. Know that we join you in giving thanks for them.

And then I'd ask you consider how you might become those living saints for someone else and give the gift you received again in gratitude. Give the gift of invitation, of welcome, of connection and care. Give by sustaining the ways that we share in holy story and sacred song. Give the gift of tending the earth beneath us and shoring up the foundation of this house of prayer for those who seek a quiet center here, and of a community where children play and grow to know themselves as beloved of God and disciples of Christ. In the next weeks, you'll receive a mailing from our faithful Annual Appeal leader, Cynthia Beggs and our treasurer, Eric Tracy. They will, as they so thoughtfully do, ask you to prayerfully consider how you might weave the gifts of your life into the fabric of our common life through your annual pledge in the next year. Please do so. Do not forget that at any amount, the most meaningful commitment is the gift of your life, presence, and participation in this community as a witness to the Spirit's work among us.

When we pray, and give, and bless here... we do not do so just for ourselves, our families, even for the congregation of this moment... we do so with gratitude for all those who came before us, and with commitment to share this amazing gift of life and ministry long after us.

Njalo, the song, doesn't really have an end... it just repeats... the gathered people sing it as long as we feel the joy of it. The joyful song of life together in Christ repeats, too. Singers change, new harmonies develop, but the songs goes on... Always... Always, we are being renewed. All of us. In prayerful life and worship, in giving of our lives in service, in blessing all we share. Always.





The Foreside Book Club started off this season with a fun and informative conversation about How to Read a Book by Monica Wood. We discussed all the characters (parrots included!) and the underlying themes of letting go of guilt, seizing second chances, and how books can change our lives.



Our next meeting will be on Wednesday, October 16 at 4:00 p.m.in the large classroom when we will be discussing Horse by Geraldine Brooks.

"A discarded painting in a junk pile, a skeleton in an attic, and the greatest racehorse in American history: from these strands, a Pulitzer Prize winner braids a sweeping story of spirit, obsession, and injustice across American history.

Kentucky, 1850: An enslaved groom named Jarret and a bay foal forge a bond of understanding that will carry the horse to record-setting victories across the South. When the nation erupts in civil war, an itinerant young artist who has made his name on paintings of the racehorse takes up arms for the Union. On a perilous night, he reunites with the stallion and his groom, very far from the glamor of any racetrack.

New York City, 1954: Martha Jackson, a gallery owner celebrated for taking risks on edgy contemporary painters, becomes obsessed with a nineteenth-century equestrian oil painting of mysterious provenance.

Washington, DC, 2019: Jess, a Smithsonian scientist from Australia, and Theo, a Nigerian-American art historian, find themselves unexpectedly connected through their shared interest in the horse--one studying the stallion's bones for clues to his power and endurance, the other uncovering the lost history of the unsung Black horsemen who were critical to his racing success. Based on the remarkable true story of the record-breaking thoroughbred Lexington, Horse is a novel of art and science, love and obsession, and our unfinished reckoning with racism." (quoted from Goodreads.com)

"Little Children of the World"

"Little Children of the World" (www.littlechildren.org) was incorporated in the USA in 1987 for the purpose of addressing the plight of poverty-stricken children around the world. One year later LCW established "Little Children of the Philippines." In late 2000 a soup kitchen was started in Dumaguete City, Philippines, initiated by an international volunteer, Alex Nickerson, through funding from her church, Foreside Community Church. For the past 24 years family and friends of FCC have continued to fund this soup kitchen through the Ministry of Justice & Outreach. The long-term goal of this project is to impact the lives of these children from Dumaguete's most blighted community so that they will be healthier, happier, and able to attend school.

Following evening prayers on Wednesday October 2, starting at 6:30 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. downstairs, Carmenia Benosa, president of Little Children of the Philippines, and Brittany Foster, LCW VP of International Relations from LCW, will share with our church how Little Children of the Philippines has positively impacted the lives of not only the children but also their entire families. J&O invites all FCC members and friends to attend, taking time to learn about this important work and how our church continues to help these families. Light refreshments will be served.

October Mission Moment Announced



The Rwandan genocide ended in 1994, but teams of terrorists lingered hidden around the country for years. In 1999 a fifteen-year-old boy, Frederick Nbabaramiye was dragged from a bus and commanded to kill 18 fellow passengers, But when he refused the rebels tortured him and hacked off Frederick's hands with machetes. Although left for dead, he staggered through the wilderness and was delivered to a hospital by several courageous local people.

After a year of pain spent in hospital, Frederick was placed at the Imbabazi (Forgiveness) Orphanage. Most of Frederick's family had been slaughtered and his mother, who survived, did not have the resources to care for him. Through all his physical and emotional pain, Frederick struggled to learn how to overcome his handicaps so that he would not be a burden and could live independently. At Imbabazi he met a young teacher, Zacharie Dusingizimana. Frederick was unwilling to remain captive to hate and anger and he turned instead toward forgiveness and action. Frederick and Zacharie joined together to work for a way to help those survivors like themselves.

With the support of the Columbus Zoo's Partners in Conservation and Jack Hanna, the two young men founded the Ubumwe Community Center where survivors can be educated, receive skills training and ultimately earn a living to care for themselves. Today Both Frederick and Zachary speak internationally. They share the message that disability of spirit is far worse than disability of the body. Today Fredrick models his triumph over his physical limitations through his artwork, his obvious zest for life, and his courage.

On October 20, Frederick has been invited by the Ministry of Justice & Outreach to share his message of Forgiveness during a Mission Moment. After the service Frederick will lead families in their own personal art experience work shop.

A workshop for *The Bells of Casco Bay* has started back up on Thursday mornings @ 9:00 a.m. in the sanctuary. Are you interested in learning how to

Progress continues on the Memorial Garden

We were finally able to find a stone engraver (after being "stonewalled" by another firm). He got right to work and did a very nice job!



We will very soon have two nice pieces of lacy fence, and a swath of ferns encompassing the large rocks, and at least one climbing hydrangea, which will take several years to take hold and cover the fence.

The current plan is to have the garden dedication and yearly remembrances on or around All Saint's Day, or November 1st.

The Memorial Garden Ministry, or MGM for short, has been busy writing guidelines for the garden, and if you wish yourself or your loved ones to be included on the rocks, be looking at them, and ready to reserve your spaces. More details will be available after the Governing Board has given us their blessing. Stay tuned for further updates.

DANCE PARTY TO BENEFIT PLANNED PARENTHOOD IN MAINE


Featuring Gina and the Red Eye Flight Crew


