### *An Invitation to November 3rd Memorial Garden Dedication*

Dear Foreside Friends -

Many years ago, a vision began to take hold in this congregation: one of a sacred space in which we would be able to draw close around us the cloud of witnesses who have built up, strengthened, and lit up the life and ministry of this church. A Memorial Garden was envisioned in which members and friends of the congregation could choose to be remembered. This outdoor space would create a peaceful, reflective, and worshipful place at the heart of the church's campus with a simple inscription of names and dates of our dear friends on memorial stones, and the possibility of interring ashes for those that choose to do so.

In the past two years, it has been a gift to watch a committed team of members and friends of our congregation, especially in connection with the family of our own beloved Geoff and Betsy Gattis, turn this vision into a reality in our midst. They have created a sacred space in which the congregation, friends, and family can gather to remember those saints (like Geoff and Betsy) who have gone before us... and we can give thanks for all the gifts of life woven into the life of Christ here.

**On Sunday, November 3rd, then, I want to invite you to both our annual All Saints Sunday observances in worship and, immediately following, to a dedication of the Foreside Community Church Memorial Garden.**

The Garden will be open to all members of Foreside Community Church as a place for memorializing themselves and their loved ones and the years of their lives, as well as for interring or scattering ashes as place of sacred rest. Members may enroll at any time in the year, and each year we will engrave the names of those who have enrolled.

***There are many to thank for this gift to our common life, and to our campus.***

Above all, I want give thanks for the generosity and commitment of family and friends of Geoff and Betsy Gattis, especially Bryan and Elise Gattis-Wulff and Barton Gattis, who saw in this project an opportunity to offer a lasting gift to the life of our congregation which matched the devotion Geoff and Betsy gave to everything they did here among us.

Their gifts include the establishment of the *Geoff and Betsy Gattis Memorial Fund*, which will provide financial assistance to families who might not otherwise be able to memorialize loved ones in the garden. This, too, maintains that legacy of welcome, justice, and generosity Geoff and Betsy shared here and throughout their lives. **(cont. next page)**

Many thanks go to our new Memorial Garden Ministry Team, chaired by Carol Ward. She is joined by Gail Adshead, Marian Albee, Parker Albee, Dotty Blanchette, Peter Cinelli, Janet Clough, Bruce Kaake, Kathy Hillman Reed, Stan Reed, Debbie Reifsnnyder, Robin Singer, Joyce White, and Elise Gattis-Wulff. They may not have moved literal mountains... but several good sized chunks of one—to bring this project to fruition, and they did so while honoring the calls of the Spirit in this work as well. There were times of laughter and of tears in the faithful conversations and discernment they did... and that testifies to the full gift of life they each brought to this work.

We have been assisted by skilled artisans and workers along the way, including Tony Muench - Landscape Architect, Seth Bullock Stonework, Thomas Richards Monuments, Ethan Chase Carpentry, and Rodney Coleman Landscaping. All of them brought their gifts and found an appreciation for being involved in a project intended to bring peace and welcome to others in tender times of grieving and times of joyful remembering.

Linked below, you'll find documents and policies to enroll yourself or loved ones in the Garden. Forms are also available in the church office. Again, enrollment may be completed at any time, but engravings will be added once a year.

**The deadline for this first year of engravings is Thursday, November 14th.**

Please come and share in blessing, dedicating, and giving thanks for this sacred place, faithful work, and joyful gift of love, remembrance, and hope. For above all we give thanks and praise to God for this life abundant in which we share here at FCC, and for Christ's life eternal in which we will find ourselves caught up in a cloud of so many who have gone before in the fullness of God's love.

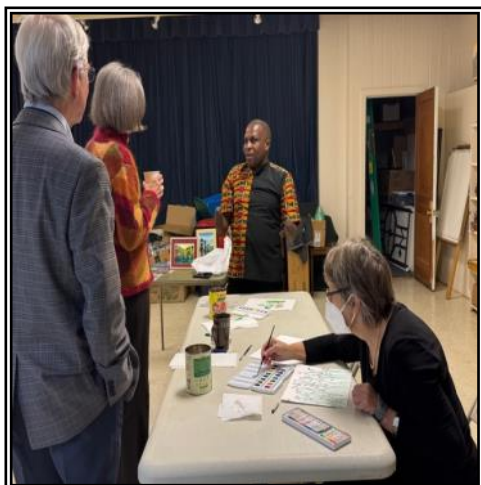
### *Welcome New Members!*

Frederick shared his story of torture at the hands of terrorists who dragged him, at age 15 from a bus, and demanded that he kill a number of his fellow citizens. When he refused, Frederick had both of his hands and partial arms hacked off with a machete. It has been an unimageable road to healing, during which the now Falmouth resident found mental restoration through art. After worship, Frederick (**pictured below left**) then led an attentive group of FCC friends and members through the practice of art as a healer. #### Three Sisters Potluck on Wednesday November 20<sup>th</sup>

Please join the Green Team and Fellowship after evening prayers (approximately 6:30) for a potluck celebrating the Three Sisters.

Who or what are the three sisters, you ask. The three sisters were the mainstay of Abenaki agriculture in Maine. The first sister is **corn**, planted in little mounds. It will grow tall to support the second sister. The second sister is **beans**, planted in the mounds 2 weeks after the **corn**. The beans pump nitrogen into the soil. The third sister is **squash**, planted 2 weeks after the beans. The third sister spreads her leaves all around the mound to create shade and hold in moisture. Together in community they thrive.

Why the three sisters' theme? Because together we thrive as a community just like the three sisters and it is a way to celebrate and acknowledge all that nature gives us during this time of Thanksgiving.

Fellowship and the Green Team are asking you to join us in this celebration by bringing a dish to share at the potluck – preferably one that includes corn, beans, or squash/pumpkin. Of course, if you have your heart set on bringing something else, that is fine as well. We welcome all dishes. If you need ideas for a Three Sister dish, feel free to reach out to Liz Ventre. She has lots of recipes to share.

So, mark your calendars for a meal together to celebrate our community and the gifts that nature provides.

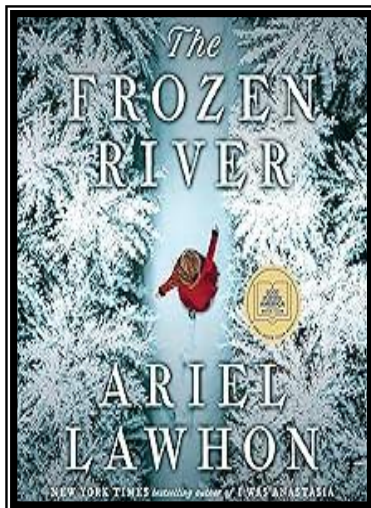
*The Foreside Book Club* had a wide ranging discussion of the many different themes of horse racing, slavery, and discrimination presented in Horse by Geraldine Brooks. We all learn so much through our thoughtful sharing. In November we will meet to discuss Frozen River by Ariel Lawhon. Summary follows from [bookbrowse.com](http://bookbrowse.com):

"Maine, 1789: The Kennebec River freezes, entombing a man in the ice. Martha Ballard is summoned to examine the body and determine cause of death. As the local midwife and healer, Martha is good at keeping secrets. Her diary is a record of every birth and death, every murder and debacle that unfolds in the town of Hallowell. In that diary she also documented the details of an alleged rape that occurred four months earlier. Now, one of the men accused of that heinous attack has been found  
d e a d i n t h e i c e .

While Martha is certain she knows what happened the night of the assault, she suspects that the two crimes are linked, and that there is more to both cases than meets the eye. Over the course of one long, hard winter, as the trial nears, and whispers and prejudices mount, Martha's diary lands at the center of the scandal and threatens to tear both her family and her community apart.

In her newest offering, Ariel Lawhon brings to life a brave and compassionate unsung heroine who refused to accept anything less than justice on behalf of those no one else would protect. The Frozen River is a thrilling, tense, and tender story of a remarkable woman who had the courage to take a stand, and in the process wrote herself into American history.

### *Angels come in many different forms!*

The Foreside Community Church has our “Christmas Angels.” These are the local children that live in families who struggle with poverty, ill health, or special long-term disabilities. Each Christmas for more than two decades the FCC community has sponsored dozens of children who need warm winter clothes. For years Justice & Outreach has worked with several different organizations that supported children in need but when their policies changed, we decided that it was best if the children were known to our ministry. For several years most of the children are members of families who receive help from the Falmouth Food Pantry, and some are families who are part of Neighbors In Need.

**On November 10**, the Christmas Angel Tree and the Angel tags will be in the narthex. Our congregation is invited to select a tag and then to sign out that tag in order to purchase an article of new clothing for a specific child. Each tag has the first name, gender, and age as well as their most needed request. Parents were asked to carefully limit their requests out of respect for the finances of each sponsor. J&O requests that your wrapped gift with the **Angel tag attached be returned to the FCC office no later than December 1** to allow time for gifts to be organized and delivered by pantry volunteers. If you sponsor a child and would like to include a personal note, please feel free to do so. Because of privacy concerns, we do not include direct contact information with the tags but the family is free to decide if they wish to respond to your note.
