

#### The Hope Squad

Our first Mission Moment of the new year, facilitated by the Justice & Outreach Ministry, and scheduled for Sunday, January 12 is from the "Hope Squad" which is a small, local, nonprofit agency that works with the unhoused population in Portland. The Hope Squad works out of a donated ambulance and provides support to unhoused people in Portland. The group began with Matt Brown and his wife; Nancy Helm who saw a need and wanted to do something. In the last 5 years the group has grown to approximately 15 volunteers who spend each Friday providing food, clothing, beverages and HOPE to members of the unhoused community. This is a group that cares deeply about others who are struggling; often with substance abuse disorder and The monthly book club will start off the new mental health challenges.

The goal of the organization is to provide resources to these people but more importantly to connect with individuals and to let them know that they matter. Over time relationships grow and opportunities arise to assist individuals in a variety of ways. This is work that matters and makes a difference.




might be the better model than what we practice today. Her quote is "All flourishing is mutual."

This long novel follows John Wheelwright as he comes of age in a small fictional town in New Hampshire with his best friend Owen Meany. Owen, despite being physically small and having a unique highpitched voice, possesses spiritual strength and wisdom be-

yond his years. His childhood friend, John Wheelwright, provides a perspective on Owen's life, starting from their shared childhood in the late 1950's. The book explores themes of friendship, destiny, and the relationship between faith and doubt. It describes how Owen Meany's life and death provide evidence of God's existence, and how this evidence can help people resolve their doubts about faith. Summary follows:



"Eleven-year-old Owen Meany, playing in a Little League baseball game in Gravesend, New Hampshire, hits a foul ball and kills his best friend's mother. Owen doesn't believe in accidents; he believes he is God's instrument. What happens to Owen after that 1953 foul ball is both extraordinary and terrifying. At moments a comic, self-deluded victim, but in the end the principal, tragic actor in a divine plan, Owen Meany is the most heartbreaking hero John Irving has yet created." Quoted from Goodreads. #### State Street Shelter Updates


We are **looking for volunteers to take shifts hosting families.** Like last year, we will team up with Falmouth Congregational Church to staff a particular week. (**January 12-18**, though volunteers are welcome at other times.) The volunteer need is simply one person to be a greeter, from 6pm to 8:30pm, supported by staff person who speaks many languages. Then there is a need for two people to spend the night from 8pm to 7:30am. Each person will have a "private" room to sleep in. Since we host children in the shelter, a background check is required of all volunteers.

A new addition this year is to keep the shelter open on Sundays and holidays. The morning shift is from 7:30am to 12:30pm, and the afternoon shift is 12:30pm to 5:30pm.
